European Private Law. The Roots and the Future

Professor Ugo Mattei

This first part of the course should serve to develop a critique of European private law as a professional project in the intellectual tradition of the critique of political economy. It will consequently provide a broad introduction to the dominant European legal mentalité seen as a regime of disciplined knowledge. It will include discussion of the scientific, political, institutional and philosophical biases of the current "European private law professional industry". The discussion will develop a strong critical "pars destruens" and sketch some traits of a possible "pars construens" based on a full- fledged recognition and elaboration of the commons as a foundation of a private law alternative to private property.
